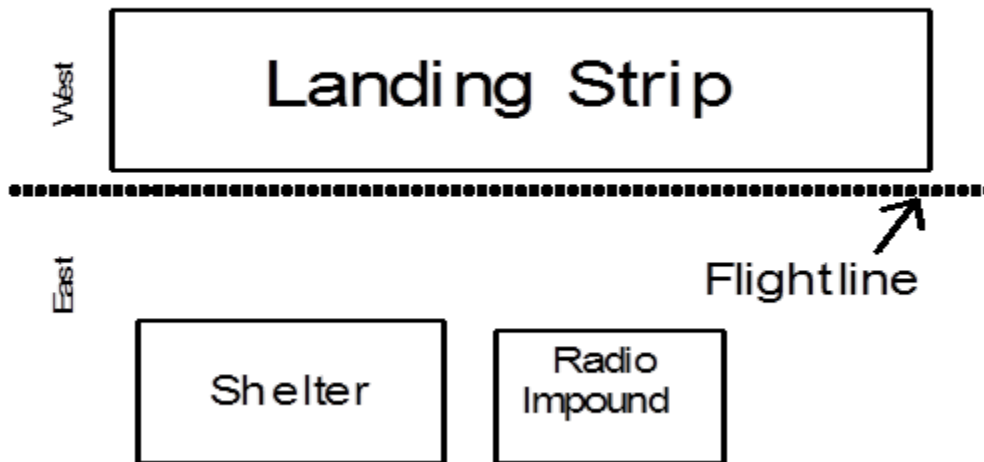


Puget Sound Silent Flyers Flying Field Safety



Please observe these important safety rules while you are here.

Spectators:

- You must stay behind (east of) the flight line at all times.

Pilots:

- You must have a valid, current AMA card and be a competent RC pilot.
- Beginning pilots must fly with an experienced pilot until everyone involved agrees that they are competent to fly alone.
- You must remain behind the flight line unless you are launching or retrieving an airplane from the landing strip.
- You must announce your entrance onto, and departure from, the landing strip.
- An airplane must never fly east of the flight line.
- You must not launch an airplane from behind the flight line.
- Visitors are permitted to fly only when a PSSF club member is present.
- Visitors are welcome to fly here three times, after which you must become a member of PSSF.

Radio procedure for 2.4 GHz transmitters:

Place your current AMA card on the cork board or a 2.4 clip area of the radio impound.

Turn on your transmitter, range, check, ground check, fly.

Radio procedure for fixed frequency transmitters:

- Before you turn on your radio, you must place your AMA card into the clip beneath your frequency in the radio impound. Then clip the pin containing your frequency number on your antenna.

- When you are not flying, return the pin and remove your card from the frequency so that others may use that frequency. Do not turn your transmitter on unless you have the frequency pin.
- **Anyone who causes damage to another aircraft because their transmitter is turned on without a frequency pin will be responsible for repair of the damaged aircraft.**

If you are a current member of PSSF your name should be on the current member list that is maintained in the radio impound.

Helicopters sometimes practice off to the side of end of the runway depending on the wind. Spotters and communication with members on the flight line is mandatory.

Sharing the airspace and frequencies is necessary whether it is for 3-D fixed wing or helicopters as well as gliders. Communication and cooperation are the keys to this working.

We do observe quiet hours by waiting until after 8 A.M. to fly anything that is at all noisy.

We also ask that you drive into the site quietly and slowly to avoid spooking the mules belonging to a friend of the landowner as well as avoiding the wrecks, wreckers, tractors, pedestrians and gardeners who share this approach.

There are frequently damaged vehicles, motorhomes, boats and tankers as well as farm machinery parked on the property. All of this is off limits to us and it is especially important to respect the property of the landowner. Our lease **does not** allow us unlimited access to the entire field or wooded areas.
